## **ORDINANCE NO. 23-18**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND, REVISE AND SUPPLEMENT CHAPTER 22 OF THE BOROUGH CODE, ENTITLED "LAND DEVELOPMENT", MORE SPECIFICALLY ARTICLE VIII, ENTITLED "ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT", AND MORE PARTICULARLY § 22-89, ENTITLED "ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT", MORE PARTICULARLY § 22-101, ENTITLED "WATER RUNOFF CONTROL," BY ADDING A NEW § 22-101.5 ENTITLED "PRIVATELY-OWNED SALT STORAGE FACILITIES", TO THE ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF NORTH PLAINFIELD

**WHEREAS**, the Borough of North Plainfield has previously enacted a Stormwater Management and Control Ordinance contained in the Borough Code; and,

**WHEREAS,** the State of New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) requires that the Borough make certain revisions to its Stormwater Management and Control Code provisions.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the Borough Council of the Borough of North Plainfield, County of Somerset, State of New Jersey that Chapter 22 of the Borough Code, entitled "Land Development", more specifically, Article VIII, entitled "Zoning Board of Adjustment", and more particularly § 22-101, entitled "Water Runoff Control", be amended, revised and supplemented by adding a new subsection § 22-101.5, entitled "Privately Owned Salt Storage."

#### § 22-101.5 Privately-Owned Salt Storage Facilities

#### § 22-101.5.1 Purpose.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to prevent stored salt and other solid de-icing materials from being exposed to stormwater. This ordinance establishes requirements for the storage of salt and other solid de-icing materials on properties not owned or operated by the municipality (privately-owned) in the Borough of North Plainfield to protect the environment, public health, safety and welfare and to prescribe penalties for failure to comply.

#### § 22-101.5.2 Definitions.

For the purpose of this Ordinance, the following terms, phrases, words and their derivations shall have the meanings stated herein unless their use in the text of this Chapter clearly demonstrates a different meaning. When consistent with the context, words used in the

- present tense include the future, words used in the plural number include the singular number, and words used in the singular number include the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directory.
- A. "De-icing materials" means any granular or solid material such as melting salt or any other granular solid that assists in the melting of snow.
- B. "Impervious surface" means a surface that has been covered with a layer of material so that it is highly resistant to infiltration by water.
- C. "Storm drain inlet" means the point of entry into the storm sewer system.
- D. "Permanent structure" means a permanent building or permanent structure that is anchored to a permanent foundation with an impermeable floor and that is completely roofed and walled (new structures require a door or other means of sealing the access way from wind driven rainfall).
   A fabric frame structure is a permanent structure if it meets the following specifications:
  - 1. Concrete blocks, jersey barriers or other similar material shall be placed around the interior of the structure to protect the side walls during loading and unloading of de-icing materials;
    - 2. The design shall prevent stormwater run-on and run through, and the fabric cannot leak;
    - 3. The structure shall be erected on an impermeable slab;
    - 4. The structure cannot be open sided; and,
  - 5. The structure shall have a roll up door or other means of sealing the access way from wind driven rainfall.
- E. "Person" means any individual, corporation, company, partnership, firm, association, or political subdivision of this State subject to municipal jurisdiction.

#### § 22-101.5.3 De-Icing Material Storage Requirements.

- A. Temporary outdoor storage of de-icing materials in accordance with the requirements below is allowed between October 15<sup>th</sup> and April 15<sup>th</sup>:
  - 1. <u>Loose materials shall be placed on a flat, impervious surface in a manner that prevents stormwater run-through;</u>
  - 2. <u>Loose materials shall be placed at least fifty (50) feet from surface water bodies, storm</u> drain inlets, ditches and/or other stormwater conveyance channels;

- 3. Loose materials shall be maintained in a cone-shaped storage pile. If loading or unloading activities alter the cone-shape during daily activities, tracked materials shall be swept back into the storage pile, and the storage pile shall be reshaped into a cone after use;
- 4. Loose materials shall be covered as follows:
  - a. The cover shall be waterproof, impermeable, and flexible;
  - b. The cover shall extend to the base of the pile(s);
  - c. The cover shall be free from holes or tears;
  - d. The cover shall be secured and weighed down around the perimeter to prevent removal by wind; and,
  - e. Weight shall be placed on the cover(s) in such a way that minimizes the potential of exposure as materials shift and runoff flows down to the base of the pile.
    - (1) <u>Sandbags lashed together with rope or cable and placed uniformly over the flexible cover, or poly-cord nets provide a suitable method. Items that can potentially hold water (e.g., old tires) shall not be used;</u>
- 5. Containers must be sealed when not in use; and,
- 6. The site shall be free of all de-icing materials between April 16<sup>th</sup> and October 14<sup>th</sup>.
- B. De-icing materials should be stored in a permanent structure if a suitable storage structure is available. For storage of loose de-icing materials in a permanent structure, such storage may be permanent and thus not restricted to October 15-April 15.
- C. All such temporary and/or permanent structures must also comply with all other Borough ordinances, including building and zoning regulations.
- D. The property owner, or owner of the de-icing materials, if different, shall designate a person(s) responsible for operations at the site where these materials are stored outdoors and who shall document that weekly inspections are conducted to ensure that the conditions of this ordinance are met.

#### § 22-101.5.4 Exemptions.

This Ordinance does not apply to facilities where the stormwater discharges from de-icing material storage activities are regulated under another NJPDES permit.

## § 22-101.5.5 Enforcement.

This Ordinance shall be enforced by the Construction Official and/or Property Maintenance Inspectors of the Borough of North Plainfield during the course of ordinary enforcement duties.

#### § 22-101.5.6 Violations and Penalties.

Any person(s) who is found to be in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall have seventy-two (72) hours to complete corrective action. Repeat violations and/or failure to complete corrective action shall result in fines as follows:

- (a) The fine for any offense which is a first (1<sup>st</sup>) repeat offense shall be \$500, plus costs; and,
- (b) The fine for any offense which is a second (2<sup>nd</sup>) repeat offense, or any subsequent repeat offense shall be \$1,500, plus costs.

## § 22-101.5.7 Severability.

Each section, subsection, sentence, clause, and phrase of this Ordinance is declared to be an independent section, subsection, sentence, clause, and phrase, and finding or holding of any such portion of this Ordinance to be unconstitutional, void, or ineffective for any cause or reason shall not affect any other portion of this Ordinance.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED** that this Ordinance shall take effect, after final passage, twenty (20) days following action or inaction by the Mayor as provided by law or an override of a mayoral veto by the Council, whichever is applicable and publication in accordance with law, unless a resolution is adopted, pursuant to *N.J.S.A.* 40:69A-181(b), declaring an emergency and providing that this Ordinance shall take effect at an earlier date.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOROUGH COUNCIL APPROVING PAYMENT NO.2 (FINAL) TO VORTEX SERVICES, L.L.C. AND THE CLOSING OUT OF THE CONTRACT AND THE RELEASE OF RETAINAGE FOR THE ROCKVIEW AVENUE SANITARY SEWER REHABILITATION PROJECT.

**WHEREAS**, the Borough of North Plainfield previously awarded a contract for the Rockview Avenue Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation Project (hereinafter referred to as the "Project") to Vortex Services, L.L.C. (hereinafter referred to as the "Contractor"); and,

**WHEREAS**, David Testa, P.E., C.M.E., C.P.W.M., of Grotto Engineering Associates, L.L.C., the Borough's Engineer for the Project, on behalf of the Borough, by letter dated November 16, 2023, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Acting Borough Clerk and made a part hereof, has reviewed the Contractor's submission for Payment No.2 (Final); and,

**WHEREAS,** the original contract price for the Project was Three Hundred Thirty Five Thousand Six Hundred Eight Dollars and Sixty Four Cents (\$335,608.64), which has been adjusted by the Final Contract Completed Cost, decreasing the final contract amount to a final Contract Price of Two Hundred Seventy Nine Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty Seven Dollars and Fifty Nine Cents (\$279,737.50); and,

**WHEREAS,** the Contractor has submitted said Final Payment No.2, adjusted by the above amount, to a final Contract Balance due in the total amount of Twelve Thousand Four Hundred Fifty Four Dollars and Seventy Five Cents (\$12,454.75), plus the release of any and all of the Contractor's retained funds held by the Borough for the Project; and,

**WHEREAS**, in accordance with the Contract, the Contractor has submitted a one (1) year Maintenance Bond in the amount of Two Hundred Seventy Nine Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty Seven Dollars and Fifty Nine Cents (\$279,737.50), with an effective date of November 15, 2023; and,

**WHEREAS**, Director of Law/Borough Attorney Eric M. Bernstein, Esquire and the offices of Eric M. Bernstein & Associates, L.L.C. have reviewed the Borough's Engineer on this Project and the Contractor's submissions and accept same based on the recommendations of the Borough Engineer.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Borough Council of the Borough of North Plainfield, County of Somerset, State of New Jersey that the request for Partial Payment No.2 (Final) and the Closeout of the Rockview Avenue Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation Project is approved with Vortex Services, L.L.C., whose main offices are located at 210 Bennett Road,

Freehold, New Jersey 07728, in the total amount of Twelve Thousand Four Hundred Fifty Four Dollars and Seventy Five Cents (\$12,454.75) plus the release of any and all of the Contractor's retained funds held by the Borough for the Project, which Final Payment Request and Closeout request is incorporated herein by reference as if same was fully set forth within and payment for same is authorized to be made to the Contractor, without the need for any further action of this Borough Council; and,

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the original contract price for the Project was Three Hundred Thirty Five Thousand Six Hundred Eight Dollars and Sixty Four Cents (\$335,608.64), which has been adjusted by the Final Contract Completed Cost, decreasing the final contract amount to a final Contract Price of Two Hundred Seventy Nine Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty Seven Dollars and Fifty Nine Cents (\$279,737.50), which final contract price is hereby approved; and,

## A Sample of Investigations & Arrests

On September 3, 2023 at 03:57 hrs., officers responded to a residence on Duer Street for a report of a fight. When they arrived, they observed a paper towel saturated in fresh blood in front of the house and a trail of fresh blood continuing up the stairs in the direction of the second-floor apartment. After knocking on the door multiple times and announcing it was the police, they could hear the individuals inside moving swiftly, doors closing, and saw the lights turn off. Because of the amount of blood and being concerned for the wellbeing of the people inside, forced entry was authorized and officers entered the apartment. It was determined through the investigation that a male who lived at that apartment was the victim of a robbery. The male victim reported while walking home from a bar, he was robbed by two black males who demanded his cell phone. When they tried to take his shoes, he fought back and was stabbed in the right foot with a beer bottle. NPFD EMS treated the victim at the scene, but he refused further medical treatment.

On September 22, 2023, at 2036 hrs., patrol responded to the area of Washington Avenue and Myrtle Avenue for a report of a stolen motor vehicle. The officers met a male victim who was attempting to locate the stolen vehicle. The victim reported that at approximately 8:15pm, he left his vehicle, a white Lexus, running in a parking lot of a business on Somerset Street, but he had the key fob. He observed a black male, wearing a red hooded sweatshirt and jeans, enter his vehicle and drive away. The victim attempted to get the male out of his vehicle, but could not. The victim and a bystander

attempted to follow the vehicle. The vehicle fled south on Steiner Place and drove through multiple side streets before going into Plainfield. At some point, before going into Plainfield, the vehicle came back to the parking lot to pick up at least one other individual. The on-call detective and Plainfield PD were notified. The vehicle was entered into NCIC as stolen and a Somerset County Alarm was faxed. The vehicle was recovered by the Newark Police Department on September 26, 2023.

On September 25, 2023, 0959 hrs., patrol responded to a car dealership on Route 22 for a theft of two motor vehicles. The complainant, a store manager, stated over the weekend two motor vehicles were stolen from the used car lot. The two vehicles were a 2020 white KIA Sportage and 2021 gray KIA Seltos. The manager was able to log into a Lojack account and locate both vehicles in New York. Both vehicles were entered into NCIC as stolen and a county alarm was issued. At 1600 hrs., the Kia Seltos was located in Brooklyn, NY and towed by NYPD tow service. At 0600 hrs., on September 26, 2023, the Kia Sportage was also located in Brooklyn, NY. The actors attempted to steal two other vehicles but could not get them started.
